APPROVING THE EXECUTION OF A CERTIFICATE OF AUTHORITY AND APPROVE AN EASEMENT AGREEMENT WITH THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF THE ARMY FOR RADIO TOWER FACILITY LOCATED IN CAESAR CREEK LAKE STATE PARK

WHEREAS, this Board, by and through the Warren County Telecommunications Department, maintains and operates a radio tower on real property owned and maintained by the United States Department of the Army, commonly known as Caesar Creek Lake State Park; and

WHEREAS, the original easement granted from the Department of the Army authorizing the Warren County Board of Commissioners to maintain and operate said radio tower has expired; and

WHEREAS, the Department of Army and the Warren County Board of Commissioners, through its legal counsel, have agreed to new terms and conditions for a succeeding easement to authorize the continued operation of said radio tower for an additional 25 years.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, to approve and execute the attached Certificate of Authority and approve the United States Department of Army Easement No. DACW27-2-22-043 which succeeds Easement No. DACW27-2-01-046 and grants Warren County Board of Commissioners the right to maintain and operate a radio tower and support building with a fence on approximately 0.12 of an acre, across U.S. Tract Nos. 610 and 621, Warren County Caesar Creek Lake Project, Ohio, for an additional 25 year term, and to return the executed documents to the Department of Army U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, Louisville District, for execution and recordation.

DISCUSSIONS

Gary Estes, Deputy Director of Telecommunications, was present to discuss the CAD (Computer Aided Dispatch) Incident Messaging Feed Policy. Mr. Estes stated that various public officials and school employees are receiving CAD messages that contain protected incident information provided to law enforcement and first responders relative to 911 calls. Mr. Estes stated the proposed policy would appropriately protect and allow limited access to the private information.

There was discussion relative to the County's responsibility of following the law and the reason for change in current practice.

Upon further discussion, on motion, upon unanimous call of the roll, the Board resolved (Resolution #24-0210) to implement the CAD (Computer Aided Dispatch) Incident Messaging Feed Policy, effective February 6, 2024.

MaryLynn Lodor, General Manager of Miami Conservancy District (MCD), presented the attached PowerPoint providing a readjustment update for flood protection. Ms. Lodor outlined the flood protection system, protected areas, capital needs, and readjustment process of the Miami Conservancy District.

There was discussion relative to the process of assessing the MCD tax to affected properties and the current financial state of the MCD.

Ms. Lodor stated it is the Miami Conservancy District's goal to make the district more visible to the public by hosting open houses and public hearings for residents.

Bill Spry, President of Spryex Radio, was present to discuss the addition of a radio antenna to one of Warren County's existing towers. Mr. Spry stated Spryex Communications is a non-profit organization that holds the license for three radio stations in Ohio. He addressed the need to update the location of his existing radio antenna due to the inability to receive a signal.

There was discussion relative to the determination as to whether or not the County is permitted to allow the antenna on an existing tower and the public purpose if it was permitted.

Bruce McGary, Assistant Prosecuting Attorney, stated the County would need more information to evaluate the situation and determine if it is permissible by law.

Susan Walther, Deputy County Administrator, stated the Board entered into contract with 4C for Children for the training and recruitment of Type B providers relative to Human Services and publicly funded childcare. Due to the lack of measurable results from the provider, the County desires to terminate said contract.

Upon further discussion, on motion, upon unanimous call of the roll, the Board resolved (Resolution #24-0211) to terminate subrecipient agreement with 4C for Children for recruitment and training of Type B providers relative to Warren County Human Services and publicly funded childcare.









Readjustment of the Appraisal of Benefits

2024

- Conservancy Court may order a "Readjustment of the Appraisal of Benefits" when they find a material change in property value or condition
 - May not occur more frequently than once every 6 years, per ORC 6101.54
- Readjustment was delayed 3 years by Butler County Appeal
 - Previous Readjustment: Effective 2012
- Board of Appraisers reviews and updates the benefit methodology
 - Ensures assessments are fair and equitable
 - MCD has used that methodology to calculate new benefits.
 - 2023 county auditor property values are used to calculate new flood protection benefits for the 7th Readjustment






The flood protection system positively influences <u>flood</u> <u>insurance rates.</u>

Cameron Goschinski, Regional Planning Commission, presented the attached PowerPoint presentation stating the applicant/owner, property size and location, proposed use, allowable uses, and requested rezoning. He then presented the Regional Planning Commission Executive Committee recommendation to deny the rezoning request and the Rural Zoning Commission recommendation to approve the rezoning request.

Sophia Holley, Attorney for the property owner, stated the JEDD has had no development in the last seven years and the property owner has a viable business, Southern Tire Mart, who is ready to move forward with the purchase and development of the property upon approval of the proposed rezoning.

Jillora Summers, property owner, stated she has been unable to sell the inherited property due to the amount of property tax assessed on the property. Ms. Summers further stated the current JEDD Overlay prohibits the use of the property for the proposed business looking to purchase it.

John Boynton, President of Southern Tire Mart, stated the purpose of the business is to provide light mechanical and tire work to broken down vehicles on the highway. He stated Southern Tire Mart offers 24-hour service, 7 days a week and will travel on average 45 to 65 miles to repair vehicles and semi tractor trailers. Mr. Boynton further stated the Pilot Flying J Travel Center located next to the proposed business is a perfect partnership opportunity.

Jonathan Sams, Turtlecreek Township Trustee, stated the Township does not have an issue with the proposed use of the property but believes there is better approach to request the zoning change for allowable uses of the property to ensure protection of the JEDD.

There was discussion relative to the proper procedure for changing the zoning of allowable uses of the property and discussion relative to the Board's discretion on allowing zoning changes for future allowable land use within the JEDD.

Bruce McGary, Assistant Prosecuting Attorney, stated the approval of the rezoning of the aforementioned property complies within the current zoning code and the decision of the Board can be justified based on the decision-making determination criteria as set forth in the current zoning code.








