DISCUSSIONS

On motion, upon unanimous call of the roll, the Board entered into executive session at 9:11 a.m. to discuss personnel matters within Building Services and Workforce One pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 121.22 (G)(1) and exited at 10:00 a.m.

Jeff Weber and Karen Whittamore, Workforce One, were present along with Julia Abell, Chairman of the Workforce One Board to present the Workforce One 2009 Annual Report (copy of report attached hereto and made a part hereof).

Mr. Weber stated that there was a total of 88,000 customer visits recorded in the three county Workforce One District and that the new job creation is down 30% along with a 33% decrease in economic dollars invested within the three county region.

Mr. Weber then stated that Warren County has stepped up in the region as a leader and is leading the effort in economic development as well as jobs. He also stated that Warren County has a large focus on business outreach.

Ms. Abell stated that the Summer Youth employment program was a huge success and employed 500 youth from age 14 to 21.

Commissioner South noted that Warren County's numbers on the Annual Report show the highest placements within the region.

Commissioner Young then requested clarification on the Six Sigma Certification training being provided as part of the jobs training portion of the program.

Mrs. Whittamore explained that Six Sigma Certification was originally established for high level executives but has evolved into a "bottom up" training as well. She stated that when certain clients has a set of skills that need to be updated in order to make them marketable to the private market, then these types of training are utilized.

Commissioner Young then questioned an average cost per individual that is provided.

Mrs. Whittamore stated that there is a cap of \$15,000 per individual; however, if that much was approved for every client, then there would not be enough funds to serve the number of individual that need help. She stated that with the inclusion of pell grants and other funding available to the clients, Warren County spends significantly less than the \$15,000 limit.

On motion, upon unanimous call of the roll, the Board accepted and approved the consent agenda.

PUBLIC HEARING

REZONING APPLICATION OF DAVID AND MARY HAEUSSLER TO REZONE 6.3916 ACRES IN UNION TOWNSHIP FROM TRAILER CAMP "T-C" AS A PLANNED UNIT DEVELOPMENT TO RURAL RESIDENCE "R-1"

The public hearing to consider the rezoning application of David and Mary Haeussler, owners of record, was convened this 30th day of March 2010, in the Commissioners' Meeting Room.

Kim Lapensee, Executive Director of the Warren County Regional Planning Commission, stated that is property is the former "Big Turtle Lake" campground. She then stated that the property has been purchased and the property owner desires to construct a single family residence. She then stated the Regional Planning Commission Executive Committee's recommendation to approve the rezoning application.

Mike Yetter, Zoning Supervisor, stated that the property owner is a veterinarian and wants to build a single family residence on the property and operate as a farm with cows and horses. He then stated that he has removed some of the existing trailers from the property and that remaining trailer will be removed once the tenants lease expires.

Upon further discussion, there being no one to speak in favor of or in opposition to said rezoning application, the Board resolved (Resolution #10-453) to approve the rezoning application.

Vicky Perry, Grants Coordinator, was present to give a presentation of explanation of the various housing programs.

Mrs. Perry explained that the First Time Homebuyer Program was initially created through Community Housing Improvement Program dollars but now is funded through program income. She explained that through this program, the County has helped 168 household purchase and/or repair homes. She stated that as homes are sold or refinanced, the dollars are returned to the program and are then used to help another first time homebuyer.

Mrs. Perry then explained that Neighborhood Stabilization Program has two aspects. She stated that the program was established to help stabilized the housing market during the collapse of the housing industry by providing funds for the purchase and renovation and then resale of foreclosed homes. She then stated that the other half of the program allows for the purchase of slum and blight homes to be purchased and then torn down in order to clean up a neighborhood. She stated that the funds can also be used to tear down an abandoned home and then a lien is

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placed on the property to be repaid once the property is purchased. She stated that half of the program funds are used for demolition and the other half for rehabilitation and resale of homes.

Commissioner Young stated his concern that the government should not be in the habit of competing with the private market. He stated that there are private individuals that make a living out of buying foreclosed properties, renovating and reselling. He then stated he would like additional information, in a spreadsheet form, relative to the various programs, how many individuals benefit from the program and what programs and funded through "recycled" money versus new dollars. He also reserved the right to make a determination at a later date as to his desire to terminate any of the programs currently being funded within the County.

Commissioner South stated her desire for the Rehab Board to reconsider how program money is distributed. She stated her desire for the Board to consider not loaning program dollars on top of the maximum qualified loan amount of the household but rather, help with the down payment assistance in a combined total amount that does not exceed the household's maximum qualified amount. She stated that if the Board changed its guidelines, it would allow the family to have a "cushion" of money rather than possibly be "maxed" out. She also requested the Board to consider rather than having the funds paid upon sale or refinancing of the home, if the policy is changed, they would begin repayment of the funds which would in turn provide program dollars faster as well as provide additional equity into the property for the buyer.


